About Us

anadian Parents for French is a nationwide, researchinformed, volunteer organization that represents 35.000 members across Canada and champions the opportunity to learn and use French for all those who call Canada home.

Originally a small group of concerned parents who met in Ottawa founded Canadian Parents for French in 1977. These parents wanted to ensure that all children would have the opportunity to become bilingual in the Canadian school system.

Canadian Parents for French has evolved into a proactive National Network with 12 Branches and offices and over 140 Chapters, serving its members and educational stakeholders in communities nationwide.

In 2021-2022, Canadian Parents for French worked together as a national network to lead governance initiatives in support of Canadian parents and FSL learners, with a focus to building strong, inclusive, equitable and shared leadership, supporting engaged membership and volunteers, and delivering relevant, quality programming to parents and youth learning and using French. Our work has, despite our advocacy position of access for all, brought to the forefront the acknowledgement how some voices and experiences are often missing from decision making processes exacerbating systemic inequities in our society. The CPF Boards and staff leaders have committed to take a learning and change journey. Our efforts focus on understanding the roots of the inequities and building an approach to change and transform how we work. We are undertaking difficult and challenging conversations, but we are committed to the changes that are required to remain relevant and serve all those who call Canada home. We promise you, our members, and stakeholders, to listen, share our expertise with you and engage you in this important and ongoing work.

CPF Nova Scotia acknowledges that we live and work in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral territory of the Mi'kmag peoples. This territory is covered by the "Treaties of Peace" and Friendship" concluded with the British Crown in 1726. The treaties in question did not include a clause relating to the cession of lands and resources. This truth is an uncomfortable one, but one that is necessary to face as Canadians and the people of Canada if we are to understand our whole history. We honour the Mi'kmag, whose stories have been shaped by Mi'kma'ki.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Every year, Canadian Parents for French, Nova Scotia works hard to create and promote activities for youth across the province to learn and use French. This year, we were able to do so by organizing an exciting and creative mix of in-person, hybrid, and virtual events that reached children the length of Nova Scotia.

Our flagship **Concours d'art oratoire**, cancelled in 2020, came back in 2021 with a twist: Concours in the classroom ensured that students were encouraged to express themselves while staying in their classroom bubble. Over 700 students from grades 1-12 took part across the province. Bravo, les élèves! There were many other activities keeping students engaged en français: Sciences en folie was a roaring success, and Nova Scotia now has over 3,000 budding bilingual

scientists thanks to these fun classroom workshops. Our virtual events included a March Break camp, a national Foire virtuelle aux carrières, magic shows, tutoring and coding, while in-person activities like the pop-up events and summer camps continued to attract students and families.

Youth are at the forefront of our programming, and CPF Nova Scotia works hard to engage members and volunteers so that we can support increased access to French-language learning opportunities. This year, in addition to our longstanding French for Parents classes, our outreach activities included an outdoor movie, French family art walks, and a Parent Wellness Fair. Since literacy is at the core of language acquisition, CPF Nova Scotia provided teachers with a free membership to Idéllo resources, had a French/ Gaelic book giveaway, and set up a Little Free Library in our office. Vive les lecteurs!

In order to guarantee that youth in Nova Scotia continue to benefit from high-quality French as a Second Language education, CPF Nova Scotia continues to advocate for linguistic duality in the province. This means increasing the visibility of French through social media outreach, eBulletins, and advertising campaigns. It also means working closely with our valued partners and engaging in consultations with local community groups and government officials. Our staff and Board stay up to date with the issues affecting French as a Second Language Education in Nova Scotia and across Canada by participating in a multitude of training opportunities. This strengthens our governance and leadership capacity – collaboration and sharing expertise ensures that we can always put our best foot forward for our youth.

CPF Nova Scotia is proud of its partnerships and its reputation as a "go-to" organization for all things French Second Language. I'd like to thank all of you – our dedicated staff, Board, volunteers, members, students and teachers - for your commitment to French Second Language in Nova Scotia. It's through your efforts that we can ensure the day-to-day and long-term success of Canadian Parents for French so that French-English bilingualism can be a reality for youth in Nova Scotia.

This report gives only a taste of what **Canadian Parents for French, Nova Scotia** was able to do over the past year. I can assure you that there are already exciting new projects in the works for 2022-2023. Spoiler alert: the Family French Weekends are not to be missed! Concours d'art oratoire



CPF Nova Scotia held a virtual Concours d'art oratoire award ceremony on May 8, 2021 to announce its provincial winners. Our keynote was Anna Gaudet, a provincial and national Concours winner in 2017 for her speech on time travel. Students in grades 9-12 submitted their speeches by video. Grade 11/12 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place then participated in the National Concours d'art oratoire in June 2021.




Salma Khattab, a Grade 12 French Immersion student at Citadel High School placed first in the late immersion category Grade 11/12, provincially and then again at the National level! Her speech focused on how personal interests influence our learning choices. The topic idea came to her one day when she was reflecting on what degree to pursue at university, and what career path she wanted to pursue. She started to notice that she performed better in the subjects she enjoyed.

She then started to do some research to see if there is a relationship between if people enjoy what they are studying and if their performance level increases.

Salma is attending Dalhousie University pursuing a Bachelor of Medical Sciences with a Minor in French. "Being passionate about medicine but also wanting to keep engaged with the French language, I chose to customize my degree by adding French. In the future, I am hoping to become a Medical Officer in the Canadian Armed Forces. With national and international travel. being bilingual is an important asset to a CAF Officer. Concours en classe!

CPF Nova Scotia continued promoting the Concours this year with certificates, ribbons and participation prizes for teachers to use in their classrooms. The activity was available to students in grades 1-8. Concours en classe took place from November 2021 to February 2022. Over 700 students in core/integrated French, French immersion and français langue maternelle participated.

Sciences en folie!

This virtual workshop series has been quite the hit with grade 1-6 teachers across the province. **CPF Nova Scotia** offered virtual workshops from Sciences en folie Montréal in November 2021 and March 2022. We had a record breaking **3,463 students** participate from **82 schools**. Teachers were offered a choice of fun. virtual workshops (Slime, Junior Reactor, Fossils, Science Detectives and Fantastic Flight) that introduced students to STEM concepts. Workshop materials and video were designed for teachers with or without a science background to use.

Summer Camps

Summer 2021 was jam packed with activities. CPF Nova Scotia was able to offer our French summer camp program in person again, although on a limited basis. Campers were able to participate in our day camps in Halifax and Dartmouth or for older campers; there was Camp Frantastique and Camp de la Baie, our overnight camps. Contactless registration facilitated parent drop off and pick up. Campers stayed in small groups to minimize contact and participated in many outdoor activities. Virtual camps continued for campers in rural areas or wanting to keep their French skills up over the summer. Weekly virtual camp was offered in the mornings for six weeks. In the afternoon, there was a workshop option of conversation club, book club or Kids Code Jeunessse. Kids Code Jeunesse was offered for eight weeks with campers learning easy coding for different online projects.






FIRST TIME ATTENDING A FRENCH SUMMER CAMP




HOW WOULD YOU DESCRIBE YOUR FAMILY?

BALAD'ARTS

Balad'Arts en famille with Alliance Française d'Halifax and Fondation Communautaire du **Grand-Havre**

Canadian Parents for French, Nova Scotia and Alliance Française Halifax received funding from Fondation Communautaire du Grand-**Havre** for a collaborative project, Balad'arts en famille/ Family Art Walks. Les Balad'arts

en famille was a series of artistic walks and discussions in French for families in different neighborhoods of Halifax, led by local artists. The project was open to Francophone and Francophile families in the Halifax Regional Municipality. The project promoted community development, awareness and visibility.

There were six walks completed from August to November: Vagues/Ondes-Fréquences, Perspectives/point of view, Layers/ Strates et Textures, À la loupe - Close looking, Performance/ Happening, and Findings/Trouveilles. Lucie Taussig and Sophie Philipczuk of *Alliance Française Halifax* acted as guides for each family art walk.

During these one-hour walks, the group discussed different themes relating to the neighborhoods and using different artistic mediums to explore the environment. The materials were provided to participants. Artists involved included Jessica Winton, Emma Fitzgerald, and Sophie Philipczuk. Henri Paratte of the Halifax Public Gardens also acted as a guide for family art walk in the Halifax Public Gardens.

Parent Wellness Fair!

With restrictions on gatherings due to the pandemic, CPF Nova Scotia looked

to alternative ways to support parents during the school year. A virtual Parent Fair took place from November 25-27, 2021, three days of events for parents and families. Day one kicked off with President Kate Ashley facilitating a virtual round table organized by **Alliance Française d'Halifax**. The topic was French Languages in Daily and Family Life. Expertise and advice was shared by presenters, Carole Bonin of CASLT, Karin Amedikouh of the CSAP and Barbara Abdelilah-Bauer, Author. Day two was two workshops on **Boukilli** and *Idéllo*, introducing parents to these awesome online resources for supporting French learners at home. Mary Beth Carty entertained families with a late afternoon concert. Day three ended on Saturday morning with Sandy and Thomas from Razzmatazz for Kids concert.

Donors

In the past year, CPF Nova Scotia has increased its fundraising efforts. Members of our Board of Directors have donated a portion of their expenses back to support our organization. CPF Nova Scotia solicited sponsorship to cover the costs of printing a French book, Les Lunettes roses et violettes d'Anna for our May

2022 book giveaway to teachers and schools. The French summer camps program received sponsorship from Université Sainte-Anne.



CPF Nova Scotia signed a sponsorship agreement with L'Association des collèges et universités de la francophonie canadienne (ACUFC) to promote the Bursaries for Postsecondary Studies in French program for students entering eligible Francophone universities.

In previous years, Joan has fundraised to support the Excellence in French awards for local high schools by participating in the Bluenose Marathon. With the cancellation of the event, Joan hosted a virtual Pampered Chef event and donated her commission, and also held a Birthday fundraiser soliciting donations from her family, friends and chapter members. Chapter Updates



The Lunenburg County chapter supported parents within the South Shore Regional Centre for **Education (SSRCE)**. The SSRCE is in the process of gauging parent interest in a grade 6 Intensive French program at Bayview Community School in 2022-2023.

Joan Dobbie, President of **CPF Halifax Peninsula and Mainland South** organized a Gregg LeRock Outdoor French concert held in the bandstand at the Sir Charles Tupper Elementary School on October 5, 2021. The chapter also organized a Marc Tardif Virtual Halloween Magic Show for early immersion students attending École LeMarchant-St. Thomas School. The show took place in October 2021.

The chapter also received a \$650 Cultural Grant from the CPF National contest held in April 2021 during **National Volunteer Week**. The grant covered the cost of the Halloween themed French Magic Show.

Schools continued be closed to outside visitors and French immersion information nights were virtual. CPF **Nova Scotia** created a **Myth Busters** campaign as an advocacy tool for parents considering registration in immersion programs. Many of the myths highlighted are common assumptions not supported by research.

CPF Nova Scotia created **10 Myth** Busters posts for the month of pre-primary/primary registration, when

parents are deciding on whether to register in the early immersion program. The Myth Busters posts were published twice a week on Facebook and Instagram. Overall reach of the campaign was 7,000+ people and the posts were shared by other CPF chapters and branches.

Overall, this was an excellent campaign that addressed some common myths about learning French. The goal was to help parents who were unsure of the early immersion program to now feel more at ease and registered their children!

CPF Nova Scotia celebrated the Landscape of Grand-Pré for Heritage Day 2022

Four posts were created by Nicole Kabalen, Communications Coordinator (Atlantic region) celebrating the history, culture and landscape of the Grand-Pré World Heritage site. The social media promotion did very well on Facebook with the posts reaching over 8,700+ people.



Idéllo Membership for Nova Scotia FSL Teachers

CPF Nova Scotia signed a two year agreement with **Groupe Média TFO** to provide *Idéllo* subscriptions to teachers and their students. *Idéllo* is a dynamic, multileveled, digital learning platform for everyone including parents, teachers, educators and students. Through Idéllo, teachers have access to over 17,000 up-to-date, enriched educational resources in French, as well as functions and a workspace that encourage communication between communities of users with common interests. The agreement with *Groupe Média TFO* also covers workshops to be presented for FSL consultants, coordinators and teachers at each Regional Centre for Education.

CPF ADVOCACY IN ACTION

Take your career further as a **French Teacher in Nova Scotia**

CPF Nova Scotia received funding from **Canadian Heritage** for a 2-yr teacher recruitment project, Take Your Career Further as a French Teacher. In year 1, the campaign launched with brochures, website and a social media campaign. Due to the ongoing pandemic, it was not possible to complete in class presentations on university campuses as outlined in the project agreement. Instead a series of videos were developed and a YouTube channel set up for the project. The project was limited to Nova Scotia and our four universities offering a B.Ed program with the option of a French teachable; Université Sainte-Anne, Acadia University, Mount Saint Vincent University and St. Francis Xavier University. With additional funding from the CPF National office, CPF Nova Scotia extended the project to the Atlantic region and include Université de Moncton, Memorial

University and University of PEI. The Program Coordinator also participated in virtual career fairs and the French for the Future local forums.

CPF Nova Scotia participated in a meeting with **Table nationale en français langue** seconde (TNFLS) to share results of year 1 of the project. The project added to national database for access by researchers and FSL teachers. The project was also shared with NS Education in a meeting with FSL consultants and coordinators from each Regional Centre for Education.

In year 2, the website was redesigned to include a guiz for those interested in learning more about becoming a teacher. The guiz was accompanied by a social media campaign called **Be You In French.** A new website address, beyouinfrench.ca pushed traffic from Instagram, Facebook and TikTok to the Take Your Career Further website. The campaign used Facebook and Instagram stories, as well as videos on TikTok to promote the project.

CPF Nova Scotia also did an extensive bus promotion campaign in March 2022. Over 830,000+ people were exposed to campaign posters on public transit in Halifax, Moncton NB, Charlottetown PEI, and St. John's NL.

To finally wrap up the project, the remaining funds were distributed through \$1,000 entrance scholarships to students entering the B.Ed programs in the Atlantic region. Students submitted essays or video submissions on why they were choosing French teachable in their B.Ed program.



French Second Language Educator of the Year 2021

Rima Majaess, a name who's no stranger to CPF Nova Scotia, was awarded French Second Language Educator of the Year. Rima was a French Second language teacher with the Halifax **Regional Centre for Education** (HRCE) for the past 35 years, and recently retired this past June. She has gone above and beyond with her students providing them with opportunities such as Français pour l'Avenir forums, the Model United Nations program in high schools, and the Bilingual Career **Exploration Day**.



Rima has volunteered countless hours for multiple organizations, such as the Halifax Rotary Club, the

NS Language Teachers' Association, Alliance Française Halifax, Canadian Parents for French, and more! She has also dedicated her time to assist new English as a Second Language Students. Rima brings so much passion to everything she does. We wish you the best of luck in your retirement and are so proud of your accomplishments!

Celebrating Gaelic Nova Scotia Month



Over 100 + books celebrating Gaelic Nova Scotia Month given to 32 schools. May is Mios nan Gàidheal Gaelic Nova Scotia Month in Nova Scotia, a month to celebrate and create awareness of the history, culture, language, contributions, and achievements of Gaels across the province. 2021 marked the 25th anniversary of Gaelic Nova Scotia Month with the theme, Air Adhart Le Chéile | Forward Together. The theme celebrated the togetherness of the Gaelic communities and resilience found in Gaels throughout history.

To celebrate Mìos nan Gàidheal | Gaelic Nova Scotia Month, CPF Nova Scotia in collaboration with the Office of Gaelic Affairs offered copies of Fionn MacCool et le saumon de la sagesse and G comme Gaël by Bradan Press to French teachers across the province. Having books available in French, English and Gaelic encompasses greater linguistic diversity in our schools while offering a needed resource for classroom teachers and students. The French versions of these books, in particular, reaffirm the many connections Gaels and those of Gaelic heritage in Nova Scotia have with the Acadian and Francophone communities of our Province.

Les Étoiles de la semaine, Teacher Recognition!

The past two years have presented many educators with challenges. Teachers had to continuously modify their lesson plans to accommodate abrupt switches between online learning and in-person learning. They had to manage students wearing masks, unable to have group work, and an all-in-all less social learning environment.

The purpose of "Les Étoiles de la semaine" was to increase teachers' motivation and to let them know they're truly appreciated, especially under these changing circumstances. At the end of January, CPF Nova Scotia shared the first post requesting our social media followers to send in nominations for teachers they felt went above and beyond during the pandemic. One teacher per week was recognized during February and into March. Each teacher who was nominated received a prize pack, which was shipped directly to the school. This campaign reached over 2,300+ people on Facebook and Instagram.



LOOKING FORWARD

In year two of the pandemic, I was pleased to be able to keep youth participation numbers up and to support teachers in the classroom and on line. CPF Nova Scotia was able offer the **Concours d'art oratoire** in a meaningful way that kept participation at the student, classroom and teacher level. Our French summer camp program started again with small limited groups. We continued to offer virtual camps and activities for campers who were not able to access physical camps. Our virtual activities included camp activities, book club, conversation club, March break camp and coding workshops with Kids Code Jeunesse.

The restrictions on the schools meant that outside people could not enter schools and school groups could not leave the school. Our **Sciences en Folie** workshops were the perfect solution. Our branch staff was kept busy repackaging, posting and delivering packages to schools. The single biggest challenge was coming up against late Canada Post deliveries as we moved into December. Teachers and students did not miss out if their materials arrived late as the access to the workshop was virtual.

Promotions and Communications

CPF Nova Scotia nominated Hughie Batherson, Coordinator of the Consortium National de Formation en Santé and Director of Alumni Association at Université Sainte-Anne in the Francophile category of the Lieutenant Governor's Award of Excellence for l'Acadie and Francophonie. The nomination was supported by Français pour l'Avenir. Hughie has supported both Canadian Parents for French and Français pour l'Avenir for many years and sat on the boards of each organization. Hughie received his award in July 2022.

Nicole Kabalen continues in her role as Communications Coordinator (Atlantic region) for 2022-2023. Nicole is guite active on social media for CPF Nova Scotia and CPF New Brunswick. She has supported CPF Newfoundland with

their website updates. She also promoted many of CPF PEI's activities within the Atlantic region. Nicole focused on creating three promotional campaigns in 2021-2022; Mythbusters, the Landscape of Grand-Pré for Heritage Day, and Les Étoiles de la semaine featuring teachers who were nominated by students and parents.

Advocacy

CPF Nova Scotia recognizes that there is still a great demand for French Second Language Teachers. We will continue to maintain the website and social media for Take Your Career Further as a French Teacher. The Board of Directors voted in June 2022 to continue the \$1,000 entrance scholarships for an additional three years until 2025. Seven entrance scholarships are offered, one to each university in the Atlantic region with a B.Ed program that offers a French teachable. We were so please to award five entrance scholarships in our first year. Congratulations to Julia Hines, Jillian Oldreive, Joshua Robertson, Madeline Young and Taylor Zinck!

CPF Nova Scotia held its first FSL Advocacy Breakfast event on April 5 at the Marriott Harbourfront Hotel. It was a small gathering of 16 people with representatives from the Liberal, Conservative and NDP parties, as well as Alliance Française Halifax and Dalhousie University. Presentations were done on Take Your Career Further as a French Teacher, CPF Nova Scotia youth activities and the Modernization of the Official Languages Act. Each participant received **Take Your Career Further as a French Teacher** promotional items and various CPF brochures, along with a CPF Nova Scotia travel mug.

President Kate Ashley participated in the consultations on the Modernization of Official Languages on August 9, 2022. As the representative for **CPF Nova Scotia**, Kate met with the Minister for Official Languages, Ginette Petitpas-Taylor, as well as our other Francophone partners.

Activities/Programming

Our Family Fun French Weekend finally took place in July 2022. After two years of planning and cancellations, we were able to offer our inaugural family event in Bouctouche, New Brunswick. The Family Fun French Weekend was a joint activity between CPF Nova Scotia, CPF NB and CPF PEI. Our group enjoyed activities at Les Pays de la Sagouine, the Irving Eco-Centre, the Dunes, Bouctouche Farmers Market and more. The event was covered in the media by CBC, Radio-Canada, and local news. Our next Family Fun French Weekend is scheduled for Grand-Pré in October 2022.

Our Bilingual Career Exploration Day will resume in spring 2023. We are looking forward to organizing the event on the campus of Acadia University. Our last regional Bilingual Career Exploration Day was in Port Hawkesbury in 2019.

Governance

CPF Nova Scotia participated in CPF Network Leadership events in Montebello 2021 and Edmonton 2022. Although the Board of Directors has continued to meet monthly virtually, it has been wonderful to meet in person for our Board retreats and for Network events.
